Sept 8: "Closer Than We Think: An Ingathering and Water Communion Service" with Rev. Joanna Lubkin

When we encounter others, singly or in community, what do we expect? What would happen if we expect connection? This Ingathering service includes a Water Communion ritual; bring some water from your summer travels or your kitchen sink, as we join our waters and our gifts together.

Sept 15: "All Are Called" with Rev. Aisha Ansano

Drawing inspiration from the movie Moana, we'll explore and imagine what we might be called to do or be. Guest preacher, Rev. Aisha Ansano, believes in the spirituality of food, the power of community, and the importance of self-care. She has served as Ministerial Intern at First Church in Boston, Youth Programs Coordinator at First Parish of Arlington, and is launching a dinner church in Malden.

Sept 22: "Great Expectations" with Rev. Joanna Lubkin

Ever notice how people tend to live up to our expectations -- for better or for worse? Rev. Joanna Lubkin will invite us into the spiritual practice of seeing the best in others and acting as if that was all we see.

Sept 29: "A People of Expectation: A Lay-Led Exploration"

This service, connecting congregant to congregant, gives us time to explore change, disruption, enoughness, and hope.

A Message from the Minister

Welcome to a new year, to a fresh start and to continue building on all that has come before. I'm delighted to begin this new ministry with All Souls, and to journey alongside you. A Meet and Greet in August gave us a chance to get to know each other -- and even for long-timers to discover new connections -- but I'm looking forward to getting to know you this fall. As a half-time minister, you can find me in the office on Mondays, in the pulpit two to three Sundays per month, and joining you at meetings and special events as often as possible.

This year, we'll be participating in the Soul Matters Sharing Circle, a network of Unitarian Universalist congregations who follow the same monthly themes so we can more easily share resources and create a web of support and connection. September's theme invites us to consider, "What does it mean to be a people of **expectation**?" Our worship services will give us a chance to delve deeply into these themes, as we explore our shared faith and our own spiritual journeys.

On September 8th, we'll celebrate our Ingathering Service with a **Water Communion**. Symbolic of all the places from which we've come and the gifts we bring to our community, you're invited to bring a little bit of water with you to church that Sunday morning (there will be a pitcher of water for those who have not brought some, so all can participate). Whether it's from an idyllic mountain stream or from your kitchen sink, your water and your gift is sacred.

When we next meet, please: remind me of your name, tell me about your life, and tell me what you're passionate about. I'm so grateful to be your minister.

From the Board of Trustees

Welcome back everyone to a new church year! We had a wonderful (if very hot) summer with interesting and informative services in the Parish Hall. Thank you to all who prepared and presented a service. On Sunday September 8, we will be back in the Sanctuary at 10:30. Our new minister, Rev Joanna Lubkin, will be leading with an ingathering water communion during this first service. For those who had a chance to meet and greet Rev Lubkin on August 17, I

believe you can see that this will be an enthusiastic and interesting service. For those who have not yet met her, you are in for a treat.

This summer has brought us a lot of changes in the church office. We have a new model of administrative support. We will have a new 10 hr. per week administrative assistant who will be in the office on Mondays and one other day later in the week. She will also come on a Sunday once a month for a few hours. She will be responsible for supporting the Minister and Board, answering email, telephone and voicemail, making calendar updates, amending the membership directory, creating nametags, handling one-time church rentals, and ordering office supplies. Our Massachusetts Historical Society grant project has been completed. Spencer, Sullivan & Vogt (the preservation architectural firm) delivered a very comprehensive review of the state of the exterior of the church with treatment recommendations and cost estimates. The Board of Trustees is reviewing it now and we will make a summary of the recommendations available to you.

Mary Mitchell, John Cobble and Linda Steiner are hard at work on a grant application to the Braintree Town Community Preservation Committee for assistance in funding some of the needed work.

The Board of Trustees welcomed Maureen Crimmins as a new Trustee at Large and thanked Jessica Ellstrom for her work over this past year.

Book Discussion Group

The book discussion group will resume monthly meetings on the first Tuesday of the month starting on September 3, 2019 at 7 pm in the Elliot room. We are presently reading and will discuss ***Snow Flower and the Secret Fan* by Lisa See** at this upcoming meeting.

In nineteenth-century China, when wives and daughters were foot-bound and lived in almost total seclusion, the women in one remote Hunan county developed their own secret code for communication: nu shu (“women’s writing”). Some girls were paired with laotongs, “old sames,” in emotional matches that lasted throughout their lives. They painted letters on fans, embroidered messages on handkerchiefs, and composed stories, thereby reaching out of their isolation to share their hopes, dreams, and accomplishments.

Snow Flower and the Secret Fan is a brilliantly realistic journey back to an era of Chinese history that is as deeply moving as it is sorrowful. With the period detail and deep resonance of *Memoirs of a Geisha*, this lyrical and emotionally charged novel delves into one of the most mysterious of human relationships: female friendship.

On October 1, we will be discussing ***Becoming* by Michelle Obama**

In her memoir, a work of deep reflection and mesmerizing storytelling, Michelle Obama invites readers into her world, chronicling the experiences that have shaped her—from her childhood on the South Side of Chicago to her years as an executive balancing the demands of motherhood and work, to her time spent at the world’s most famous address. With unerring honesty and lively wit, she describes her triumphs and her disappointments, both public and private, telling her full story as she has lived it—in her own words and on her own terms. Warm, wise, and revelatory, *Becoming* is the deeply personal reckoning of a woman of soul and substance who has steadily defied expectations—and whose story inspires us to do the same.

Please join us for discussion, camaraderie, and some treats even if you have not read or completed the book.

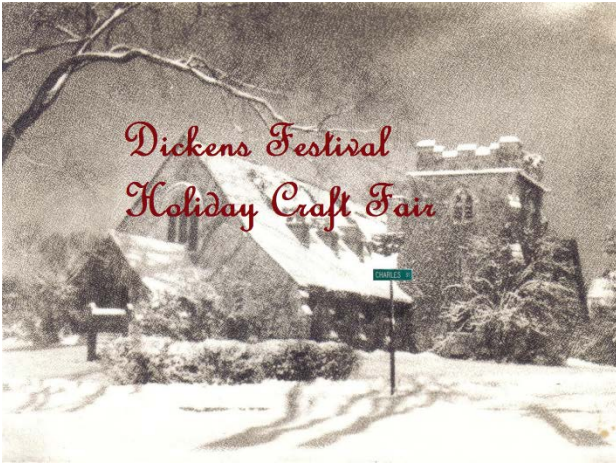
